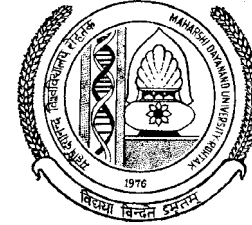

A candidate will prepare a project work under the supervison of a smember of teaching staff in the Department. The two typed copies dissertation shall be submitted by the student atleast one month before the commencement of the M.A. final theory examination.

- b) A group of students ordinaliy 2 to 4 will prepare their projects under the supervision of one teacher on the Deptt.
- c) The evaluation of the dissertation shall be done independently only byan external examiner who will also conduct the viva-voce of the candidate.
- d) A candidate will give a seminar on his project, before submission.
